


Executive Report

In the 2023–2024 academic year, the School of Graduate Studies prioritized improving the mentoring of graduate students. Following an impassioned email from Provost Smith emphasizing USU’s zero-tolerance policy for the abuse of graduate students, the School of Graduate Studies took the following actions to elevate the quality of graduate student mentorship and eradicate severe cases of abuse.

1. The School of Graduate Studies developed and continues to maintain a comprehensive repository of mentorship resources for faculty mentors. This repository includes guidelines for effective mentoring, mentoring agreements, and individual development plans.
2. Throughout the Spring 2024 semester, Professor Elizabeth Vargis led a series of workshops on graduate student mentoring, specifically designed for new faculty at USU.
3. Formalizing graduate student rights and responsibilities by codifying Codifying Graduate Student Rights and Responsibilities. New policies were introduced to deans, department heads, and the Graduate Council and have since been adopted as official policy by the School of Graduate Studies. Key topics include:
 - Clarity and limits on time commitments for graduate assistantships and the rights of graduate students to set reasonable boundaries around personal time.
 - The right to clarity on a wide range of issues, including authorship on scholarly works to which they have contributed; availability of courses in their programs of study; and on the amount, duration, and conditions of financial support.
 - The right to receive timely feedback on academic and scholarly work, and feedback about timelines for achieving academic milestones such as taking comprehensive exams and advancement to candidacy.
 - The right to have an independent party from within the University community (i.e., student, faculty member, or staff member) present in any meeting regarding academic or degree progress, standing in program, or performance within an assistantship, internship, or practicum to serve as a personal support and/or witness to the discussion.
4. To further support graduate students in resolving conflicts, the School of Graduate Studies introduced a Confidential Contact Form. This allows students and others to report and discuss challenges they face. Many issues have been resolved quickly and amicably, while a few cases have brought serious departmental concerns to light.

Starting in the 2023-2024 academic year and continuing in the current year, the School of Graduate Studies is reenvisioning training for Graduate Student Teaching Assistants and Instructors. This new training, expected to be implemented for Fall 2025, will be taught as a course with synchronous, face-to-face, and asynchronous components. The training will be customized to different teaching assignments. Graduate students who are just grading homework assignments do not need the same level of training as graduate students who are teaching recitation sections, labs, or even whole sections of courses.

Travel Funding

Each year, the Graduate School budgets \$60,000 to support students who travel to regional, national, and international conferences to give presentations. In the 2023-2024, SGS funded 274 travel awards for a total of \$66,086, with the help of educational departments such as Engineering and Science. In fall 2021, the School of Graduate Studies began funding virtual travel. This funding helped cover the cost of registration for virtual conferences. All travel awards still require a 1:1 department match.

Graduate Training Series

The Graduate Training Series (GrTS) provides monthly opportunities for graduate students to augment their studies with professional development that will prepare them for the next steps in their career paths. The workshops cover a variety of topics from presentation and job-hunting tips to navigating a graduate degree in school and after graduation. Experts from across the university are invited to present at these workshops.



Marketing, Events, & Recruitment

The School of Graduate Studies marketing efforts for the 2023-2024 academic year focused on improving events and increasing attendance, as well as, expanding recruitment efforts. The SGS marketing team used social media giveaways, surveys, and other tactics to increase engagement, awareness, and attendance at events.

Surveys sent out following the 2024 Weekend Visit event led the SGS marketing team to decide to forgo this event in the future in favor of working with individual departments to create smaller visits more catered to their department needs. In another effort to improve events, the SGS marketing team created the Graduate Student Events Committee to learn from graduate students themselves what can be done to improve events and increase attendance.



The SGS marketing team created two new monthly email newsletters: the GPC Newsletter and the Grad Student Newsletter. These have helped get the word out about events and keep everyone informed of grad school happenings. SGS has also started work on building relationships with businesses and the community to gain support for fundraising efforts including plans to start a new scholarship for graduate students.

Recruiting objectives during 2023-2024 included creating a new web page for prospective students and creating Graduate School Information Sessions and Admission Bootcamps, two new events where prospective students can come learn more about graduate education at USU and how to apply. In line with the increased focus on recruitment, the SGS marketing and admissions teams worked together to create the new prospective students page which hosts several new resources for prospective students including graduate school information sessions and online admissions bootcamp sessions.

New Graduate Student Orientation

This year's New Graduate Student Orientation was held on August 24, 2023 in the Eccles Conference Center, welcoming all the new graduate students to Utah State University.

Graduate Speaker Series with Darren Parry

In October of 2023, the School of Graduate Studies hosted its inaugural Graduate Speaker Series which featured Darren Parry, the former Chairman of the Northwestern Band of the Shoshone Nation. The Graduate Speaker Series features talks by professionals, grad students, and community members in a format that promotes enjoyment of learning, allowing grad students to listen and learn about interesting topics without any academic pressure. Darren Parry spoke on the topic of “Empowering Tomorrow’s Changemakers.” SGS provided pizza at this event. The graduate students in attendance enjoyed the event and engaged with Darren Parry’s talk.

Graduate Training Series: Teaching in Higher Education

This Graduate Training Series (GrTS), held on November 7, 2023 was a training for graduate students on the topic of “The Life of an Instructor: What to Expect When Teaching in Higher Education.” The training was hosted in partnership with ETE (Empowering Teaching Excellence) and featured a panel of three USU instructors. The panel members answered questions and spoke about the experience of being an instructor and the path that led them to their current teaching positions. Turnout for this event was fairly low, as with all midday events, and there were about ten graduate students in attendance. The students were engaged and asked several questions, which were answered well by the panel of instructors. The students seemed to appreciate this event and the knowledge they gained.

Alumni Night

On November 8, 2023, the School of Graduate Studies hosted an Alumni Night Taco Social for current graduate students and alumni. This event invited USU graduate alumni back to campus to mingle and network with current graduate students. The event included a taco bar and cheesecake dessert provided by SGS. The event had a great turnout, with over 300 grad students and alumni in attendance. Most attendees were current graduate students; however, the alumni that did attend the event seemed to enjoy it. Several grad students and alumni at the event expressed how much they enjoyed the food, socializing, and networking opportunities.



Grab 'n Go Bag Social

The 2023 Grab 'n Go Bag Social held on December 6 was attended by over 600 graduate students. The bags were filled with a variety of snacks to give students an extra boost during finals week. The students enjoyed the snack bags and many expressed their appreciation. The event was scheduled to run from 10am-4pm, but snack bags ran out at around 2:30pm. The students who arrived after the bags ran out were given the opportunity to enter a giveaway to win a JBL speaker.

Pasta Bar Social

The first social of the Spring 2024 semester was a pasta bar social held on January 25. The pasta bar social, held in the David B. Haight building, was catered by Olive Garden. The event ran from 4:30 - 6:30 with the first hour being the busiest time. The event was well-attended; 322 graduate students came to the social. The event ran smoothly, and graduate students in attendance seemed to enjoy the food and social opportunities at this event.

GrTS + ETE GrTS

The first GrTS event of the Spring 2024 semester was held on February 8 in the Merrill-Cazier Library. The topic of this GrTS event was “It’s not just you! Evidence Based Strategies on What Does and Doesn’t Work in Graduate School.” This topic was presented by David Feldon, Associate Vice Provost for the School of Graduate Studies. Graduate students learned about networking, managing expectations, working with faculty advisors, seeking feedback, choosing which graduate activities to pursue, and more.

The last GrTS event of the Spring 2024 semester was with the Center for Empowering Teaching Excellence. The topic was “Pathway to Teaching: Come Explore a Graduate Teaching Certificate.” Students at this event learned about the explore badge/micro-credential program for graduate students to learn more about teaching in higher education.

Graduate Gripe Night

The Graduate Gripe Night was held on March 26, 2024 and was hosted by the USU Student Association (USUSA). The SGS provided a hot sandwich bar with salad, chips, and cheesecake for dessert. The event allowed graduate students to come up front and share their “gripes” with the other students. The USUSA took note of all the submitted gripes so the students could vote for the best gripe, earning that student a prize. USUSA also had several minute-to-win-it challenges and games that graduate students were able to compete in to win prizes throughout the night. The students seemed to enjoy the games, prizes, socializing, food, and opportunity to share their gripes. The SGS marketing team also wrote down any gripes pertaining to issues that were within the realm of SGS’s power to fix or improve.

There were 43 students who came to view the show. Several activities, including a dance-off and a trivia competition, were held in-between acts, allowing audience members to compete to win prizes.

The culminating event of the 2024 Graduate Studies Week was the Grad Gala held on Saturday, April 6, which included dinner provided by USU catering. The night also featured dancing with music by Aggie Radio. There were 104 graduate students at the gala.

Weekend Visit

The 2024 Weekend Visit was held on Friday, February 23rd and Saturday, February 24th. This year, departments invited a total of 14 prospective graduate students to campus. The weekend started with a welcome breakfast at which Richard Cutler, Senior Vice Provost for Graduate Studies, welcomed the students and told them about the graduate student experience at USU.

The visiting students were led on a campus tour coordinated by their respective departments. After this tour, SGS held a coffee/cocoa mixer for all graduate students to attend along with the visiting students. The total attendance at this social was 141 students. This provided an opportunity for the visiting students to mingle with current grad students and ask questions about their experience.

The following Saturday morning, visiting students and SGS staff met for the optional Saturday activities. Twelve of the visiting students chose to participate in the Saturday tour. While speaking with the students during the Saturday activities, the SGS Marketing team learned that most of the students who already accepted offers to enroll in USU graduate programs.

With this new information, the marketing team sent out a survey to GPCs asking how this event could be improved in the future. After further discussion, the SGS has decided to forgo the Weekend Visit event in the future and instead work with individual departments to host smaller, tailored visits that align with each program's needs and recruiting goals. The School of Graduate Studies has been hosting annual Weekend Visits since 2017.



Applications, Enrollment, & Graduation

Applications

In the 2023-2024 academic year, applications increased from 3,029 to 3,064. While PhD applications decreased, Master's degree applications increased. Additionally, international applicants decreased from 810 to 723. Domestic applicants increased from 2,080 to 2,220. See more application data in appendix A.

Enrollment

Despite higher applicant numbers, enrollment decreased slightly from 2,758 to 2,719. See more enrollment data in appendix B.

Graduation

Graduate degrees awarded during the 2023-2024 academic year increased to over 1,100. This is a slight increase from the degrees awarded during the 2022-2023, which were just over 1,000. See more graduate degree data in appendix C.




New Programs & Specializations

Several new degrees, certificates, and specializations were approved over the past year, reflecting the growing demand for flexible and specialized educational opportunities. These programs align with current industry and societal demands, offering flexible learning pathways and interdisciplinary opportunities:


- 1. Extension Education and College Teaching:** The College of Agriculture and Applied Sciences (CAAS) introduced two Post-Baccalaureate certificates under the Department of Applied Sciences, Technology, and Education.
- 2. Composite Materials and Structures:** The College of Engineering (COE) launched both a Post-Baccalaureate Certificate and a Master of Science in Composite Materials and Structures.
- 3. Biological Engineering:** The College of Engineering (COE) introduced a Master of Engineering in Biological Engineering, catering to professionals seeking advanced training in bioengineering technologies.
- 4. Remote Sensing and Geospatial AI:** The Quinney College of Natural Resources (QCNR) added a Post-Baccalaureate Certificate in Applied Remote Sensing and Geospatial Artificial Intelligence.
- 5. Machine Learning and Artificial Intelligence:** A new Post-Baccalaureate Certificate in Machine Learning and Artificial Intelligence was introduced by the Departments of Mathematics, Statistics, and Computer Science (COS).
- 6. Data Modeling:** COS unveiled a Post-Bachelor's Certificate in Data Modeling Education through Mathematics and Statistics.
- 7. Statistics and Data Science:** The College of Science (COS) unveiled a Statistics and Data Science Ph.D. program. A new Masters program was also introduced for Data Science.
- 8. Photonics:** The College of Science (COS) introduced a certificate program in Photonics through the Department of Physics.
- 9. Health and Environmental Equity:** The College of Humanities and Social Sciences (CHASS) introduced Post-Baccalaureate Certificates in Health Equity and Environmental Equity through its Department of Sociology and Anthropology.
- 10. Second Language Teaching:** CHASS added a Master of Science in Second Language Teaching, designed to provide comprehensive training in linguistics, pedagogy, and cultural studies for educators working in multilingual settings.
- 11. Instructional Coaching and School Library Media Administration:** The College of Education and Human Services (CEHS) launched two Post-Baccalaureate Certificates through its Instructional Technology and Learning Sciences program.
- 12. Listening and Spoken Language Deaf Education:** CEHS expanded its offerings in Communicative Disorders and Deaf Education with two new programs: a Graduate Certificate and a Post-Master's Certificate in Listening and Spoken Language Deaf Education.
- 13. Dual Language Immersion:** A Post-Baccalaureate Certificate in Dual Language Immersion was introduced jointly by CHASS and COE, under the School of Teacher Education and Leadership and World Languages and Cultures.
- 14. Applied Sport Coaching:** CEHS launched a Post-Baccalaureate Certificate in Applied Sport Coaching, aimed at improving coaching strategies and performance outcomes.
- 15. Survey Methods:** Two certificates—Post-Bachelor's and Post-Master's—were introduced by CHASS in Sociology, Anthropology, and Criminal Justice.
- 16. Natural Resource Economics:** The College of Agriculture and Applied Sciences (CAAS) introduced a Master's program in Applied Economics with a specialization in Natural Resource Economics.


Annual and Monthly Application Summary

The first number above each bar indicates the number of applications received. The upper number indicates the percentage of applications of a given type received in that year.








